Social Economy in the Netherlands

- Historical background of civil solidarity: 16th century dikes building 19th century rural development – post WW2 concertation model & public involvement
- Concept of Social Economy not well known
- Social enterprises: 6000 operational (2018), grassroots organisations replacing the withdrawing government in initiatives to integrate risk groups (education, work)
- Cooperatives: 9300 primary sociaties of which 3300 are active (2021)



Cooperatives in the Netherlands

- Umbrella: NCR (National Cooperative Council), member of EuroCoop & ICA
- Cooperative Society as genuine legal personality, endorsed by Dutch civil law, requirement of notary act & registration (Economic Affairs) to be recognized as such
- Significance: by 2019 the top 100 coops
 - ➤ had a turnover of 123 billion €
 - employed 150000 FTE
 - \succ were owned by 32 mio members (incl double-counts)



Sectors with a significant coop presence

- Agriculture (dairy sector): services for farmers (logistics, tools, marketing...), coops having a market share of 80%
- Banking (roots: credit for farmers)
- Insurance (incl heath care, mutual societies)
- Wholesale & retail
- Flower auctions
- More recent: energy coops (wind mills), social coops (enterpreneurship for benefit recipients)...

Social dialogue in the Netherlands

- Unionization: 16% in 2022 (coming from 35%+ in 1970s-80s) FNV, CNV
- Empoyers organisations: AWVN, VNO-NCW, MKB-NL, UNETO (retail), LTO (agri)
- Social dialogue at national (tripartite), sectoral (bipartite) & corporate level
- Collective agreements (sector/company) as main output
- Work councils as main forum at company level
 - \succ required for companies with >50 employees
 - > union membership not required to participate



HREDD in the Netherlands

- HREDD law in the making (projected for July 2024, unless superseded by EU) legislation with a similar level of enforceability
- Will be mandatory for in-scope companies to take preventive & mitigating measures w r t HR violations in supply chain (forced labor, child labor, unsafe working conditions...), violations of animal welfare regulations, environmental damage (affecting atmosphere & climate)
- Aligning with UN, OECD, EU principles & guidelines
- Anticipating mandatory regulation, some coops have provisionally established their own HREDD policy, e.g. Campina Friesland (dairy products)



FrieslandCampina goes for cooperative sustainability

- Measuring impact of activities (maritime transport)
- Giving stakeholders (supply chain) tools & training to monitor their human rights conduct
- Sharing knowledge on HREDD with stakeholders & trading partners
- Aim for a sound & safe work environment, diversity, gender equality and inclusiveness
- Enabling suppliers to improve their quality (plan to train 75000 dairy farmers in 2025 through Dairy Development Programme) in exchange for decent price
- Support farmers in the Global South (Nigeria, Pakistan) through development cooperation programmes (Dairy Development & Foqus Planet)
- Nourishing better planet: recyclable packaging & traceable resources (palm oil, soy, pulp & paper, cocoa...)
